He came at last to a rocky mountain, at the foot of which was a small cave. Removing the stone that blocked the cave's entrance, he began to explore more eagerly. Inside, he found a large room, open to the sky and covered by the spreading branches of a palm tree. . . . Paul fell in love with the dwelling as if God had offered it to him. He spent the rest of his life there in prayer and solitude. The palm tree provided him with food and clothing. In case anyone should think this impossible, I call Jesus and the holy angels to witness that in some parts of the desert I have seen monks, one enclosed for thirty years, living on barley bread and muddy water. Another monk survived in an old well, living on five dried figs a day. These things will appear incredible only to those who do not believe that everything is possible for those who believe."

St. Catherine of Siena eagerly looked forward "to the morning's arrival in order to hear Mass." She once reflected: "In such communion, the soul binds itself fi mly to God, and knows better His truth, since the soul is then in God and God in the soul."

— JANUARY 10 —

Little children, you are from God . . . [and] the one who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world.

St. Catherine of Siena continues her refl ction on preparing for the Mass, talking about herself in the third person: "When the hour of Mass arrived in the morning—it was the feast day of Mary—she anxiously sought her usual place. From a deep knowledge of herself and with a feeling of holy justice, she was ashamed of her own imperfection, for it seemed to be the cause of all the world's evils. In this knowledge, she cleansed the stains covering her guilty soul, saying, 'Eternal Father, I accuse myself before You, so that You may punish me for my sins in this life. Since my sins cause my neighbor to suffer, I beg You, in Your mercy, to punish me for them."

You alone are the source of my strength, my joy, my justice.

— JANUARY 11 —

Give ear to my prayer, O God; do not hide yourself from my supplication.

—Psalm 55:1 (nrsv)

"I need far greater knowledge and experience than I have to describe this dark night through which the soul passes in order to reach the divine light of the perfect union of God's love. Indeed the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart.

"When [St. Antony] and his little sister were left completely on their own after their parents died (Antony was around eighteen years old), he took good care of his house and his sister. Before six months had passed, though, he was on his way to church one day when he thought about how the apostles had rejected everything to follow the Savior. He thought about how the early Christians had sold their possessions and laid the proceeds at the apostles' feet to distribute to the needy. What great hope was stored up for those people in heaven! As he was thinking about these things, Antony entered the church [and] he heard this Gospel being read: "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell your possessions and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me" (Matt. 19:21). When he heard this, Antony applied the Lord's commandment to himself, believing that because of divine inspiration he had fi st remembered the incident and that this Scripture was being read aloud for his sake. He immediately went home and sold the possessions he owned." -St. Athanasius

Show me, Holy Spirit, in some small way, how to apply your Holy Scriptures to my life.

— JANUARY 14 —

Be merciful to me, O God, be merciful to me, for in you my soul takes refuge . . . until the destroying storms pass by.

—Psalm 57:1 (nrsv)

As he concludes the short *Life* of St. Paul the First Hermit, St. Jerome writes: "I would like to ask the wealthy, 'What did this old man ever lack, naked as he was? You drink from jeweled cups, but he was satisfi d with the cupped hands that nature had given him. . . . He was clothed with Christ despite his nakedness. You who are dressed in silks have lost the garment of Christ. Paul, who lies covered in the vilest dust, will rise again in glory. . . . I beg you, whoever you are, to remember the sinner Jerome. If the Lord would grant him his wish, he would rather choose Paul's tunic, and his rewards, than the purple robes of kings, and their punishments."

Dear God, guide me today as I try to live only for what matters in eternity.

— JANUARY 15 —

For your immortal spirit is in all things. Therefore you correct little by little those who trespass, and you remind and warn them of the things through which they sin, so that they may . . . put their trust in you, O Lord.

—Wisdom 12:1–2 (nrsv)

"You will probably laugh at me and say how obvious such things are. But, until I closed my eyes to the vanities of this world, I did not see or understand who lived within my soul or what my soul deserved. If I had understood then, as I now do, how this great King lives within this palace of my soul, I would not have left

Today is the Feast Day of St. Antony the Great

St. Antony taught: "Let Christians care for nothing that they cannot take away with them. We ought rather to seek after that which will lead us to heaven, namely wisdom, chastity, justice, virtue, an ever-watchful mind, care of the poor, fi m faith in Christ, a mind that can control anger, and hospitality. Striving after these things, we shall prepare for ourselves a dwelling in the land of the peaceful, as it says in the Gospel." —As recorded by St. Athanasius

St. Catherine of Siena recalled the words of Christ: "Forgiveness comes, then, through the soul's desire to be united to Me, the infin te Good, according to the measure of love attained by the recipient's desire and prayer. A person receives as much of My goodness as he gives to Me."

— JANUARY 20 —

Cry to God Most High, to God who fulfills his purpose for me.

—Psalm 57:2 (nrsv)

"[St. Antony] obeyed [all of the holy men of the desert] whom he visited. Eager to learn, he assimilated their various individual gifts. He imitated the self-restraint of one; the cheerfulness of another. He emulated the gentleness of one; the nocturnal devotions of another; and the dedication in reading of yet another. He admired one who fasted and another who slept on the bare ground; praising the endurance of the former and the compassion of the latter. He kept in mind the love they all showed one another, and he returned to his own place refreshed by every aspect of their virtues."—St. Athanasius

Focus me, Lord, on imitating the Christian virtue of someone whom I know and respect.

— JANUARY 21 —

Be fi m, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.

—1 Corinthians 15:58 (nab)

"When the holy father Antony lived in the desert, he was overcome with many sinful thoughts. He said to God, 'Lord, I want to be saved, but these thoughts will not leave me alone. What can I do in my sickness? How can I be saved?' A short while later, when he got up to go out, Antony saw a man like himself sitting at his work, getting up from his work to pray, then sitting down to work again, and getting up again to pray. It was an angel of the Lord sent to correct and reassure him. He heard the angel saying to him: 'Do this, and you will be saved.' When he heard these words, Antony was filled with joy and courage. He did this, and he was saved." — The Wisdom of the Desert Fathers and Mothers

I will stop and pray today whenever temptations come my way.

— JANUARY 22 —

[Jesus said,] "Take care not to perform righteous deeds in order that people may see them; otherwise, you will have no recompense from your heavenly Father."

—Matthew 6:1 (na b)

"A poor person is seldom honored by the world, no matter how worthy of honor he might be. The world will more likely despise this person than honor him. A different kind of honor, to which no one can object, comes with true poverty. If one embraces poverty solely for God's sake, only God has to be pleased. A person who does not need anyone has many friends; I have found this to be true from my own experience." —St. Teresa of Avila

— JANUARY 23 —

The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

"I fi d myself at a point in my life when I can take a look back at the past. My soul has matured in the crucible of outward and inward trials. Now, like a fl wer strengthened by the storm, I lift my head, and I see that the words of the twenty-third psalm are coming true in me." —St. Thérèse of Lisieux

— JANUARY 24 —

He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

"Let our houses be small and poor in every way. Let us be like our King, who had no house except the porch in Bethlehem where He was born and the cross on which He died. These were houses where little comfort could be found. Those who build large houses no doubt have good reasons for doing so; they are moved by various holy intentions. But any corner is sufficient. . . . God preserve us from building a large ornate

convent with a lot of buildings. Always remember that these things will fall down on the Day of Judgment, and who knows how soon that will be?"—St. Teresa of Avila

— JANUARY 26 —

Out on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony.

Christ spoke to St. Catherine of Siena: "You achieve every virtue and every defect by means of your neighbor. Those who hate Me, therefore, injure their neighbor and therefore themselves, who are their own chief neighbors. This injury is both general and particular. It is general, because you are obliged to love your neighbor as yourself. Because you love your neighbor, you should help him spiritually, through prayer and by counseling him with words. Assist him spiritually and temporally with your good will, according to his needs."

"While Antony was busy with doing all these things that caused so many to love him, the devil, who could not bear to see a young man with such outstanding virtues, began to attack him. First, he tried to drag Antony away from the life to which he had committed himself. He made Antony remember his wealth . . . and his family's social status. The devil tried to stimulate in Antony a desire for material things, the short-lived honors of this world, the pleasures of different kinds of food, and many other attractions that belong to an indulgent life. He reminded Antony of the great difficulty in obtaining the life of virtue. He also reminded him of the body's weakness. He created great confusion in Antony's thoughts, hoping to call him back from his intentions." —St. Athanasius
