A Message from POPE FRANCIS

Hope to become a saint!

May the Lord grant us all the hope of being saints. But you might ask me: "Father, can someone be a saint in everyday life?" Yes, you can. "But does this mean that we have to pray all day?" No, it means that you have to do your duty all day. . . . But you have to do everything with a heart open to God, so that at work, even in sickness and suffering, even amid struggles, your heart is open to God. This is how we can become saints.

May the Lord give us the hope of being saints. Let us not think that it is something difficult, that it is easier to be scoundrels than saints! No. We can become saints because the Lord helps us; He is the one who helps us.

[Becoming a saint] is the greatest gift that each one of us can give to the world. May the Lord grant us the grace to believe so deeply in Him that we become the image of Christ for the world.

—Pope Francis, from an address given at his weekly general audience, June 21, 2017 Each day we will reflect on a saint, his or her example and teachings, and focus our intentions on God. Occasionally, we will look to a Scripture passage, rather than a saint, and pray. Each reflection requires very little reading time but offers you a way to carry the teaching throughout the day.



We begin with the greatest of the saints, the Blessed Mother, the Virgin Mary. Today, the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God, is an occasion to pray one of the oldest prayers we have. There is no better way to begin a new year than by asking Mary to pray for us.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed are thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

St. Basil the Great loved poor people with very special intentions. He also loved prayer, manual work, and living in community—all values that are rapidly vanishing from our lives today.

(Be sure to answer these questions honestly; this is a conversation between you and God alone.)

What do saints mean when they say that "everything" is in loving God and serving others? They are repeating something important that Jesus taught—do you know where in the Gospels Jesus said that?

How will you love and serve God, today?

This is probably the most important principle of prayer to learn:

"Whether we receive what we ask for, or do not, we should still continue steadfast in our prayers—because to fail in obtaining the desires of our heart, if it's God's will that we not obtain them, is for our good. For we don't know what God knows, and we don't know what is really profitable for us." —St. John Chrysostom

St. Francis of Assisi taught his spiritual brothers and sisters—in other words, people who want to become saints—to develop their passion and desire for God in the Eucharist.

Don't take yourself too seriously.

If you say you love God but you don't love others, you may not love God after all.

• 6 •

What are you most "attached to" these days? What things or people or activities most preoccupy your time?

• 7 •

"What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like."—St. Augustine of Hippo

I will show my love for others with hands, feet, eyes, and ears today.

•8•

Open your Bible and read 1 Corinthians chapter 13 today.

Then, reflect on what St. Thérèse of Lisieux once wrote in a letter:

"My director, Jesus, does not teach me to count my acts, but to do everything for love, to refuse him nothing, to be pleased when he gives me a chance to prove to him that I love him."

• 9 •

"Lord, grant that I might not so much seek to be loved as to love."
—from the traditional Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi

To know God is to love others. This is more important than feeling love ourselves.



• 10 •

If you don't feel loved by God today (we don't always *feel* it), take that as a sign that God wants you to learn something more important.

"Our Lord loves you and loves you tenderly, and if he does not let you feel the sweetness of his love, it is to make you more humble and abject in your own eyes."

—St. Pio of Pietrelcino

11 •

"We must love our neighbor as being made in the image of God and as an object of his love."—St. VINCENT DE PAUL

When you see that person at work or on the street who bothers you, try today and see him/her as someone loved by God.

• 12 •

If there is someone you don't love, or that you don't even like, you need to pray more. Pray. Now.

"Love, to be real, must cost—it must hurt—it must empty us of self."

13 •

"What a weakness it is to love Jesus Christ only when he caresses us, and to be cold immediately once he afflicts us. This is not true love. Those who love thus, love themselves too much to love God with all their heart."—St. Margaret Mary Alacoque

Lord, I will love you every day. Please show me how.

14 •

Yes, there really was a St. Valentine (*Valentinus*, in Latin), but we know nothing about him for certain. For various reasons, the early Church linked his life and reputation with love. But given the historical uncertainty, the Church removed him from the general calendar of saints in 1969.

What Christ said about love is absolutely certain: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. . . . You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these" (MK. 12:30-31, NAB).

• 15 **•**

"Do everything quietly and in a calm spirit. Do not lose your inner peace for anything whatsoever, even if your whole world seems upset."—St. Francis de Sales

Do you have something difficult you have to do today? Offer that difficulty up to God in prayer.



16 •

Today is the feast day of St. Juliana, virgin and martyr. Juliana lived in the time of the Roman Empire when a young girl would be betrothed (promised in marriage) to an older man, even if it was against her will. Well, Juliana became a follower of Christ, and was baptized secretly because her father was pagan. He didn't approve. When her wedding approached, she refused. Her father was angry and handed her over to the local governor, who was also her former fiancé, to be killed.

St. Juliana, pray for me, that I may be courageous in my faith as you were.

17 •

Are you experiencing something difficult today? If you are, know this:

"The same everlasting Father who cares for you today will care for you tomorrow and every day. Either he will shield you from suffering or give you unfailing strength to bear it."

• 18 •

Fish live best in plenty of water. People live best when they live with lots of prayer.

Try not to be someone who complains that it's Monday, or that it's raining, or that some other small thing is bothering you. Listen to a saint:

During this season of Lent, we could learn a lot from the saints. If you are finding Lenten fasting and other small sacrifices to be difficult, listen to this saint:

What pride are you holding onto? Do you really believe that God can't see it?

Pope Francis praised the American monk and spiritual writer Thomas Merton in 2013 when he spoke before a joint session of the U.S. Congress.

Pray today with Thomas Merton: "For now, oh my God, it is to You alone that I can talk, because nobody else will understand. . . . I hear You saying to me . . . 'I will give you what you desire. . . . I will lead you by the way that you cannot possibly understand."



• 3 •

"Be glad when you are blamed. In time, you will see what gains your soul experiences."—St. Teresa of Avila

This is a hard lesson to learn and accept.

Dear God, thanks for reminding me that small sufferings can teach me a lot.

• 4 •

"Even if the whole world blames you, what does it matter as long as you are in God's arms? He is powerful enough to free you from everything; only once did he command the world to be made and it was done."—St. Teresa of Avila

As I go about my day today, God, I will remain "in your arms."

• 5 •

"God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them."

Show love today to someone who wouldn't expect it from you. Surprise them with your kindness.



• 6 •

"During the time ordained for prayer, the devil is apt to arrive in the soul, causing much more conflict and trouble than when the soul is not occupied in prayer. He does this so that holy prayer may become tedious to the soul. He tempts the soul often with these words: 'This prayer avails you nothing."—St. Catherine of Siena

There are dangers in the world, even, or especially, from what we cannot see. Don't allow the devil to trip you up!

On this day in 1274, St. Thomas Aquinas died in a monastery in Italy, where he was trying to recuperate from an illness. Since his death, he has been acknowledged as one of the smartest people ever to write books of theology. Still, he once said: "Love takes up where knowledge leaves off," which means, you can't ultimately "know" your way to God.

You have to love God first and foremost. And be humble.



• 8 •

We read six special Psalms during Lent each year. They are called the Six Penitential Psalms. The first of them is Psalm 6. Pause to pray these words more than once throughout the day, today.

"The Lord has heard my supplication; the Lord accepts my prayer.

All my enemies shall be ashamed and struck with terror; they shall turn back, and in a moment be put to shame."

—PSALM 6:9-10 (NRSV)

• 9 •

The next Penitential Psalm is number 32. Pray these powerful words today and remember to go to Confession.

Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I did not hide my iniquity;
I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD," and you forgave the guilt of my sin.
Therefore let all who are faithful offer prayer to you; at a time of distress, the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them.

—PSALM 32:5-6 (NRSV)



10 •

This is a season to uncover our sins. We shouldn't be trying to hide them. We of course can never hide our sins from God. Pray today with the writer of the third Penitential Psalm:

"I confess my iniquity; I am sorry for my sin." —PSALM 38:18 (NRSV)

• 11 **•**

From the last of the Penitential Psalms:

Teach me to do your will,
for you are my God.

Let your good spirit lead me
on a level path.

For your name's sake, O LORD, preserve my life.
In your righteousness bring me out of trouble.

—PSALM 143:10-11 (NRSV)

What will you do, today, to show God that you are turning away from your sin?



•12 •

On this day in 1622, Pope Gregory XV canonized Teresa of Avila, the great Spanish mystic and theologian, author of books such as *The Interior Castle*.

"Oh, my Lord! When I think of the many ways you suffered, I do not know what to say for myself. I don't know what I must have been thinking when I wished for no suffering or what I am doing when I make excuses for myself. For what is it to you, Lord, to give much rather than little? I do not deserve it, but I have not deserved the favors you have already shown me. How can it be that I should want others to think well of someone so evil as me, when they have said such wicked things about you, who are good above all other good? It is intolerable, my God."—St. Teresa of Avila

"The whole world is not worth one soul."

Who will you help today? Who will you feed, or clothe, or comfort? With whom will you share the Good News of God's love?
