#### INTRODUCTION

ent is not only about giving things up. This is a time for refocusing and rededicating our lives. For Christians for millennia, Lent has been the most important season of life, much more vital, for instance, than Advent and Christmas, albeit with fewer celebrations.

For some Christians—St. Francis of Assisi, for example—Lent was so important that they would practice a "period of Lent" more than once a year. Today, we can at least do it once a year, for forty days, and try to do our best to do it well.

Lent is all about the profound ways we are reminded each year to turn again toward God. We have wandered. Our attention has been divided. We have lost our focus, our will. We have not loved God and others as we should. We should use this time well. Prayer can help.

It is common to refer to Lent as a period of forty days, but in truth, it is that and more.

After Ash Wednesday—which is always Day One—Lent continues for forty-six days until Easter Sunday. These are days for prayer, spiritual discipline, self-denial, and reflection. We enter into this time in the spirit of walking together with Christ through his preparation, then his Passion, and toward the Cross and the Resurrection. These are days of our fullest expression of what it means to follow Jesus in everything.

We pray that these prayers, from Christian sources of many backgrounds, cultures, and traditions, will inspire and sustain you during this most important season.

# The Beginning of Lent with Ashes

Pope John Paul II said, to begin his 2004 Lenten message about the ashes we use on Ash Wednesday,

The evocative rite of the imposition of ashes marks the beginning of the holy season of Lent, when the Liturgy once more calls the faithful to radical conversion and trust in God's mercy.

This is the day the Lenten season officially begins for Christians in the Western tradition.

#### Ashes in the Bible

The symbolism of ashes is something that Christians inherited from Judaism. Throughout the Hebrew Scriptures we see instances of the ancient Israelites using ashes to show their repentance—as when the King of Nineveh listened to this prophecy of Jonah:

Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When the news reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, removed his robe, covered himself with sackcloth, and sat in ashes. Then he had a proclamation made in Nineveh: "By the decree of the king and his nobles: No human being or animal, no herd or flock, shall taste anything. They shall not feed, nor shall they drink water. Human beings and animals shall be covered with sackcloth. and they shall cry mightily to God. All shall turn from their evil ways and from the violence that is in their hands. Who knows? God may relent and change his mind; he may turn from his fierce anger, so that we do not perish." When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them, and he did not do it.

(Jonab 3:4–10)

The humility of ashes on Ash Wednesday is only the beginning of our learning again to be humble before God. This is a time for seeking God's presence in our lives, a time for introspection.
